VALUE OF THE JOURNEY

This time will help your son or daughter understand their place in God's story by reading God's Story.

BEFORE THE JOURNEY

Schedule a time with your child to go out to dinner at a place they prefer. Bring a Bible, a pen and pad of paper

TELLING THE STORY

Step One:

- 3. What does their experience mean for us?
